    - Jacqueline Meier said that this project involves research exploring how humans engaged with animals in their everyday lives; will use technology to overlay layers of data in archeology and arts

**2021-2022 DHI Faculty Fellows Program** - The UNF Digital Humanities Institute (DHI) seeks proposa for spring/summer 2022 Faculty Fellows for projects related to the Digital Humanities. The DHI promotes collaboration on interdisciplinary projects that combine the use of technology with materials and methodologies from the Humanities, Fine Arts and Social Sciences. We seek proposal on a wide range of topics related to the digital humanities. Fellowships may be used to develop current or future DH projects, to support faculty while applying for external funding, to set up initiatives, purchase equipment, or a combination of the above. All UNF faculty are welcome to app but priority will be given to DHI-affiliated faculty. 2021-22 fellows are required to present at the 202 Digital Projects Showcase or another DHI-sponsored program.

Proposals should be 2-3 pages double spaced. Proposals should include 1) an outline of the propose project including how the proposed project connects with the digital humanities. Proposals may also include community partners scholars are working with (if applicable) and collaborations with other UNF faculty and students. 2) a brief budget (up to \$5,000). All UNF faculty are welcome to apply, bu priority will be given to DHI-affiliated faculty. **2021-2022 DHI Student Internship Program** - The UNF Digital Humanities Institute (DHI) seeks proposals for spring/summer 2022 internships for projects related to the Digital Humanities. The DI promotes collaboration on interdisciplinary projects that combine the use of technology with materials and methodologies from the Humanities, Fine Arts and Social Sciences. We seek proposal on a wide range of topics related to the digital humanities. UNF faculty and staff may develop an internship and solicit students for projects, they may also assist students in designing and applying f internships to work on projects for which their mentors are also submitting applications for the Faculty Fellows program. 2021-22 interns are required to present at the 2022 Digital Projects Showcase or another DHI-sponsored program.

Proposals should be 2-3 pages double spaced. Proposals should include 1) a brief introductory paragraph, 2) an outline of the student's proposed project and 3) how the proposed project connec with the digital humanities. Proposals may also include community partners they are working with (applicable) and collaborations with other UNF faculty and students. Please request and include a short endorsement from students' faculty mentor. All UNF students are welcome to apply, but priority will be given to students with DHI-affiliated faculty mentors. 

# 1 - Digital Storytelling Project: *One Human Race*

The "One Human Race Project" is an integrated digital project that leverages digital media to share students' original stories aiming to educate the wider public on race and racism and to bring into focus the fact there is only one human race. (continued)

The project consists of three phases. During the first phase of the project, students utilize

the EdTechTeacher's 8 steps to digital storytelling and Story Center for inspiration and to learn the essential skills to effectively develop a story. Following the conceptual phase, we focus on collecting and editing content using FinalCut Pro, a video editing software. Students learn how to navigate the software, from creating a new project and libraries to utilizing essential tools

necessary for the creation of 3–5-minute videos that incorporate multimedia (images, music, text, and voice). The final phase is focused on platforms where the content will be promoted.

This project also serves as a form of anti-racist activism as it enables students to articulate and share the materials they learned during the semester. It also creates a space where students can share their personal experiences, and challenge stereotypes, misinformation, language and examples of everyday interactions that perpetuate racism.



**Dr. Jelena Brezjanović** is a Visiting Instructor of Anthropology at the Department of Sociology, Anthropology and Social Work at the University of North Florida, where she teaches courses in Linguistic and Cultural Anthropology. The scope of her research includes studies in bilingual language patterns, migration, ethnoecology and conservation. Brezjanović holds a bachelor's degree in International Business (2001) and master's degree in anthropology (2011) from Wichita State University, and a doctorate in anthropology from the University of Florida. Her expertise in qualitative research methods was recently applied to Long-term

social-ecological research in the Florida Everglades (NSF FIU-LTER), where she conducted a study focused on water demand and land-use analyses, collaborating with Florida International University and University of Florida researchers to survey urban and agricultural land managers (e.g., farmers) and elicit their experiences and perceptions of vulnerability to climate change. Brezjanović also serves as the Executive Coordinator for the International Society of Ethnobiology, contributing her interdisciplinary expertise to help promote world-wide biological, cultural, and linguistic diversity, especially the conservation of the ecosystems and knowledge bases of indigenous communities.

# **2 - ZooMAP: Zooarchaeology of Mycenaean Artisans Project -** Jacqueline Meier, Assistant Professor of Anthropology

This digital humanities project aims to combine archaeological and digital analysis methods to clarify how animal and human lives were intertwined in past complex societies. In Mycenaean and other Late Bronze Age cultures, animals played vital roles as symbols, resources, and individuals. This project will use a multi-scalar approach to map the spatial, biological, and symbolic evidence of human-animal interactions at a craft-producing household of Mycenae, Greece. Digital network analysis will be used to visually map several types of faunal and textual evidence and better understand interactions between ancient ceramic artisans and the animals they lived with and used in the 14th century BCE. Data exploration will utilize online network and spatial mapping software, including Palladio, Gephi, and Google maps.

Although ancient texts about animals are rare at the site, the archaeological evidence of animal remains provides nuanced insights into the ways that animals were treated in life and death in a

domestic space. By combining anthrozoology and zooarchaeology with digital humanities methods, I aim to challenge current views of human-animal boundaries at Mycenae and use visual data mapping to explore changing animal personhood during a time of increased economic expansion and inter-regional connectivity. This project builds upon research funded by a Summer Stipend Award from the National Endowment for the Humanities.



**Dr. Jacqueline Meier** is an Assistant Professor of Anthropology in the Department of Sociology, Anthropology and Social Work. She is a zooarchaeologist and her research focuses on the remains of animals from archaeological sites in the Mediterranean region. She studies human-animal interactions at archaeological sites, spanning from the time of the Neanderthals to that of the Romans.

# 3 - Heca Utimile (Our Land): Digitizing an Indigenous History of Northeast Florida – Denise I Bossy & Keith Ashley

Myths about local Indigenous history broadly circulate around our region, echoing through our schools, museums, and state and national parks. Many of these myths are tremendously damaging, casting Timucuas as unchanging and unmodern while unapologetically celebrating Spanish and French colonialism. In most cases, Timucuas are depicted as merely part of Florida's ancient past and having little to do with Florida's real history. Yet, from 12,500 B.C.E. to the early eighteenth century, Northeast Florida was Indigenous country. Moreover, into the early eighteenth century, Mocama-speaking Timucuas, as well as Guales and Yamasees vastly outnumbered resident European colonizers. Focusing on the need for better public awareness and resources on local Indigenous history, we are launching a new digital humanities (DH) site to bridge the gap between the advanced scholarship on local Indigenous communities—particularly in archaeology, history, and linguistics—and public myths and misperceptions. The public deserves to know the colorful and vibrant stories of the Indigenous populations who called Northeast Florida home. In its first phase of development this fall, the site will host DH projects designed by anthropology and history students (majors and master's students) in our cross-listed seminar "Indigenous Northeast Florida." We anticipate incorporating our own research projects and future DH student projects into a dynamic site, making it the main public-facing DH site on Mocama, Guale, and Yamasee archaeology and history. This new project builds on our previous work with UNF students in designing a permanent exhibit at the Jacksonville Beaches Museum (2020) and supports our effort

Dr. Denise I. Bossy is associate professor of History at UNF, where she specializes in local Indigenous history and teaches courses on race, gender, and the early South. She is the editor of *Yamasee Indians: From Florida to South Carolina*, the prize-winning author of articles and book chapters on the Native and colonial South, and also works with local museums to improve their Indigenous content. Her forthcoming work includes the special issue of the Florida Historical Quarterly "Indigenous Florida," which she co-edited with Andrew Frank and which will be out in September. Her book manuscript, *Yamasee Mobility: A New History of the Early South*, is under review for likely publication in 2022.

Keith Ashley is Assistant Professor of Anthropology at UNF. His current research focuses on the indigenous peoples and histories of southeastern North America, particularly Florida. Presently, he is exploring the involvement of St. Johns fisher-hunter-gatherers in the broader world of Native farmers throughout the Southeast during the 10<sup>th</sup> through 13<sup>th</sup> centuries CE. He is also researching the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> century social landscape of the indigenous Mocama-speaking Timucua of northeastern Florida and southeastern Georgia. He is actively involved in archaeological excavations with UNF students throughout northeastern Florida.
